On Day 1, Biden Executive Order Issues LGBTQ Protections

A new Executive Order from President Biden directs federal agencies to assume that discrimination laws apply to sexual orientation and gender identity, and not just race, sex, religion, and national origin. Human Rights Campaign has called it "the most substantive, wide-ranging executive order concerning sexual orientation and gender identity" ever.

A new two-shot combo, Cabenuva, has been approved as a once-monthly alternative to HIV medications taken daily or multiple times a day. The new combo may be especially helpful for individuals who have difficulty staying on a daily medication regimen due to mental health challenges or other barriers.

Funding Opportunity: COVID-19 Health Equity Pilot Project

The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) Office of Health Equity (OHE) will award \$5 million in competitive grants that will be distributed between approximately 16-30 CBOs across California led by and serving communities facing COVID-related inequities. **LGBTQIA2-S** communities are identified as one of the populations facing these inequities.

This is an opportunity for CBOs to address ***underlying inequities affecting COVID-19 risk***, through policy, systems, and environmental changes such as engaging communities, supporting service navigation, improving health status and opportunities across social determinants of health. These interventions can be a community-defined best practice, evidence-based, or innovative.

Please note that this funding is provided by the **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention**. Federally qualified health centers and a number of other organization types are excluded from applying (see page 7 of RFP).

Applications are due on **March 2**. Questions about the RFA are due **tomorrow, January 28**.

Antiracism Training for White LGBTQ+ Helping Professionals March 12-14

This event is an intensive, anti-racism training for fifteen white socially conscious LGBTQPIA+ mental health providers, social service workers, and related helpers. It is offered on a free or pay-what-you-can basis.

The 20-hour weekend training will incorporate lecture, video, storytelling, large and small group discussions, personal reflection time, role-playing, somatic body check-ins, homework, personal sharing, and racial bias assessments. Using template options, each participant will create a plan for specific, meaningful, and realistic anti-racist action and accountability in their personal and professional lives.

To help create a more meaningful and personal connection, the participant number is capped at around 15 members.
